

Why is information literacy important for CCs?

In Bruce's experience...

- 'ascertain, co-ordinate and express' community opinions
 - ★ (Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1973)
- process and present information from LAs etc
- minute-writing
- information sharing: CC websites, social media etc



IL-DEM project (2016-2017)

- CCllrs use a range of practices to gather and share information.
- They generally understand 'ascertain, co-ordinate and express'
- Range of formal and informal sources to understand their roles
 - Should this be in the advice given to community councillors?
- Also tasked with sharing information from authorities to citizens.
- Mixture of digital and traditional channels
 - **★ Facebook** is where the interaction is
 - ★ Non-digital channels (eg newsletters, local networking, local press)
- Information skills are 'critically important'
 - ★ 'Information is a currency' that should be 'spent' to benefit citizens
 - Implies training needs?
 - Missed opportunity for libraries?

LIL-DEM project (2017) – some initial findings

- Usefulness for gathering information about local issues
 - 1. Other members of same CC
 - 2. LA councillors
 - 3. Residents
 - 4. LA staff this includes you!
 - 5. Other community bodies
 - 6. Members of other CCs
 - 7. Public libraries
- Most information work is co-operative.
- Most wished-for training needs
 - General skills: using social media for communicating with residents
 - Specialist skills: planning
